OVERVIEW

The FSU Flute Day started on Friday, November 22nd with our first masterclass with Vienna Philharmonic solo principal flutist Karl-Heinz Schütz. His pianist Eliko Akahori graciously filled in for some performers with great success. Schütz also gave two talks, one to Cawthon Hall students and one to the combined orchestras. Adam Workman, from Flutistry Boston, gave an indepth talk on how to choose a flute for the flute choir and Emanuel Arista also gave a great talk about his flute making history.

The full day of events on the 23rd started with a warm-up from our second guest, Dr. Elizabeth Goode from Valdosta State University. Our exhibit hall was filled with sheet music from Beethoven & Company and flutes from Flutistry Boston and Emanuel Flutes. The second masterclass with Karl-Heinz Schütz followed and we ended the morning with Professor Amsler and Dr. Goode joining Schütz for a panel discussion. Dr. Goode gave a fantastic intonation workshop and a flute

choir reading session with over fifty flutists from the studio as well as visiting students and guests. Doctoral students Adrienne Tedjamulia Read and Alan Berquist presented short topics on body awareness and Dalcroze Eurhythmics and our own Dr. Karen Large led an extended techniques workshop for all attendees, exploring a myriad of special effects. At the end of the day, we were graced with an electric and riveting recital from Karl-Heinz Schütz and his dynamic pianist Eliko Akahori.

GUEST ARTIST KARL-HEINZ SCHÜTZ

Hosting the principal solo flutist of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra Karl-Heinz Schütz was such an honor for our Flute Studio, Flute Association, and campus.

As soon as he walked in the room, Mr. Schütz was warm and charming, bringing energy and vitality to the room. In his Q&A session for orchestra members, he shared the history of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra and Opera. Sharing the traditions and legacy of the ensembles, students were amazed to hear what it is like playing a concert just about every night of the week.

In the masterclasses, Mr. Schütz worked with undergraduate and graduate students on a wide variety of repertoire. Emphasizing musicality, Mr. Schütz would often draw comparisons between flute literature and symphonic works. "This is like Brahms, and here is changes to Ravel or Debussy," he said of the Burton *Sonatina* first movement. Audience members were nearly rolling on the floor laughing as Mr. Schütz imitated French and Italian to inspire students to play with the natural flow of the composers' native tongue.

His energy and engagement with the audience was equally captivating in his solo recital. Alongside his colleague pianist Eliko Akahori, they presented a varied program of works old and new. The *Concertstück* by Joachim Anderson and contemporary piece *deep red / deep blue* by Thomas Larcher highlighted the importance of practicing extended scales as Schütz played with ease and technical facility in all registers. From Bach, Feld, and Poulenc, the recital ended with his own arrangement of Prokofiev's ballet music *Romeo and Juliet Suite, op. 64*. The audience gave enthusiastic applause, matching the energy of the performers.

FLUTE DAY EXHIBITORS

This year for Flute Day, we hosted three incredible exhibitors: Beethoven & Company, Flutistry Boston, and Emanuel Flutes.

Flutistry Boston was founded in 2011 by Adam Workman to assist flutists in finding their perfect instrument "match." In addition to the several instruments he brought for attendees to try, Mr. Workman also gave a presentation to help flutists make the best of their purchasing experience. During his presentation, Mr. Workman highlighted the importance of recording the trial and listening back because it helps flutists rate the instrument more objectively. My favorite tip from Adam's presentation was to look for an



instrument you can grow into. As we progress as musicians, our sound changes. Choosing a flute that will allow you to continue to develop your sound rather than an instrument that sounds incredible immediately will be better in the long run.



Our second exhibitor, Emanuel Arista, is a flute maker based in Boston. During his presentation, Emanuel shared that he began his journey constructing flutes in Peru in 1974 where he made flute cases with his brother. He later worked with William Bennett, developing a tuning system for his own flutes. Emanuel prides himself in hand-crafting high quality instruments that are built to last. Mr. Arista said that his favorite part of attending flute conventions and fairs is connecting with old friends and meeting new ones, too! Mr.

Arista's advice to flutists shopping for a new instrument is to be open-minded and to try new things! Mr. Arista advised that when you're trying new instruments, be sure to try playing piano; if you can play soft, you can play anything!

Our final exhibitor was Claire from Beethoven & Company! Located in Tallahassee, Florida, Beethoven & Company has been working to provide students with easy access to quality musical scores since 1999! In addition to scores, Beethoven & Company also sells batons, music books, educational resources and materials, stands, accessories, and music themed gifts to the musicians of Tallahassee. Beethoven & Company can be found at the College of Music on Tuesdays with supplies available for purchase. Claire shared that her favorite part of events like Flute Day is seeing all levels of musicians excited about music and all things flute! Claire's advice to flutists visiting the exhibit hall is to take your time and make the most of the event!

The Importance of Taking Breaks By Adrienne Read

I had the honor of presenting a little bit on this topic at Flute Day, and I wanted to write another reminder about it in our FA@FSU newsletter. This time of year can bring a lot of feelings—the stress of finals, the excitement of the holidays. With all that is going on, it can be easy to get lost in the tasks of studying, practicing, online shopping, etc. However, whatever your task is, remember that your body and your brain love to take breaks!

Oxfordlearning.com posted an article I read years ago about the importance of study breaks (https://www.oxfordlearning.com/study-break-tips/). The information transfers from study to personal practice quite easily, but I wanted to emphasize one point made in the article. Get moving. Your body was made to move, and the most effective breaks are ones when you can stretch and relieve the physical as well as mental pressure that comes from long stretches of focused work like practicing or studying. Simple is usually better when it comes to stretching in breaks because you don't have to injure yourself by being too eager or intense (you are taking a break after all). Try waving your hands above your head to increase circulation and expand your rib cage or give each one of your ten fingers a little message.

The time "lost" in a break will always be made up in the long-term, protecting yourself against burnout and being overwhelmed. A break will leave you feeling refreshed and energized, allowing yourself to work smarter and not harder. So in the end, developing a skill to take a break and come back to your work will give you more resiliency to tackle whatever project you choose.
